### ***Beyond the Bell***

This week we launched a new initiative called *Beyond the Bell*. Every Wednesday afternoon from 3:15 until 4:15pm, the Library will be open for students to do their homework. Help will be available for students who need support with their homework. Students from Year 7 through to 12 are welcome to attend. Thanks go to Mrs Nunura (HT Welfare) for initiating the program and to Mr Moller (Learning Support) for supervising the first session this week. See the flyer in this week's newsletter that will be placed around the school to advertise the program.

### **Year 12 Coaching**

In order to assist Year 12 students to set goals for their final year of study and make decisive steps towards achieving these, we have introduced a program of coaching. The first coaching sessions for Year 12 were held during term 4 of last year. This week we held our second round of coaching and this time students were able to opt in or out. Several additional staff were trained in coaching so that all students wanting a coaching session would be able to have one. The feedback from teachers running the sessions was very positive. I coached six students and they all came to the meetings well prepared with clear objectives about what they wanted to get out of the session. Through coaching, it is hoped that students will be better able to achieve goals they set for themselves. Research indicates that around six sessions is a good number to see positive results. I would like to thank all the staff who ran coaching sessions with a special thanks to Mrs Mercer for coordinating the program.

### **Year 7 Student ID Cards**

This week student ID cards arrived and these have been distributed to Year 7 students from the Office. The school ID card is a photo ID. The school photos recently taken of each student are used for the ID card. The cards have been distributed by the Office staff. If your child does not have one, please ask them to go to the Office so one can be issued.

### **School Contribution Emails**

2018 school contribution letters were emailed home this week. The email contained a listing of the fees for each student and an explanation of what each fee covered. The fees include subject specific fees, an administration charge, P&C levy on the youngest child at school's account and information on tax-deductible gift funds. This year, many payments have been included in the school contribution such as bus fees for carnivals, online study resources and Multicultural Day activities. I would request prompt payment of the contributions as courses are already running and in many cases, resources have to be purchased. If you did not receive a contribution notification or if you are having difficulty making the payment, please contact Mrs Amanda Sibbald in the school office, she will help you with both of these matters.

### **Year 7 Internal Gala Day**

A sports gala day was held for Year 7 on Friday this week. The day was run completely by Year 11 and Year 12 Sports Coaching students as part of their course. The format for the day was similar to the format that will be used later in the year for Year 7 when they compete against other schools. Year 7 students were placed in teams that competed against each other playing the same sport throughout the day. Thanks go to Mrs Terrey and Ms Paterson and the senior Sports Coaching students for organising the day.



### Updating student records

This week the office have mailed out to all families, a copy of the information we hold on your students along with a request for these to be updated if they are not correct. The information includes contact details, medical information and permission to publish. Whether changes are made or not, all forms need to be returned to acknowledge the correct or amended data. I would encourage everyone to respond so that we know our records are accurate. Can you carefully check the email address we hold for you as this will be our primary means of communication in 2018.

### Athletics Carnival Change of Date and Venue

Our school athletics carnival was scheduled to be held at the NSW Sport and Recreation camp at Narrabeen on 26 March. One of the reasons we use this venue is that the all weather athletics track can still be used when the weather means that other fields may be closed. This track is currently undergoing renovations and this week we were contacted by the Centre to say that the track would not be ready by 26 March and they had to cancel our booking.

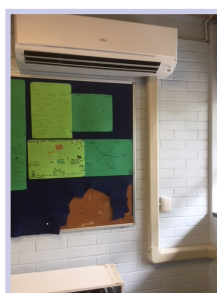
**At short notice we were able to book Bannockburn Oval on 11 April. Please note this date change and change of venue for the carnival.**

### Air Conditioning

Work is progressing on air conditioning the upstairs classrooms in B-Block, A-Block, D-Block and E-Block. At this stage, most of the B-Block classrooms have had units installed. The units being installed are energy efficient and a press timer button will turn them on. The temperatures will be set for winter or summer and remotes will not be left in classrooms. These measures should reduce operating costs and be better for the environment. Thanks go to the P&C for providing this wonderful resource.



### Car Maintenance Tips from Aris

Members of the community regularly come forward to tell us about good things (and sometimes not so good things) that our students do in public. However, I have never really had one like this. Aris K is a student in Year 12 with a passion for cars. Last week Aris went to the aid of a motorist with a flat tyre in the car park at Coles Asquith. The motorist posted a thank you on Facebook, stating the only two things she knew about her helper – that his name was Aris and that he is a student at St Ives HS. My email box is full of complimentary messages about Aris. When I mentioned this to Aris, our conversation soon got onto the topic of changing tyres. I asked Aris how quickly he could change a tyre, he said "well that depends sir, is the spare a space saver?" I asked why this was significant and Aris told me that it is illegal to put these on the front axle of a car, they can only go on the rear. So, if your spare is one of these and you have a flat on a front tyre, you have to put the spare on a rear wheel and move the rear wheel to the flat on the front. This is because the space saver comprises the handling and steering of the car if they are on the front of the vehicle. Aris has many more tips like this. Aris is very mindful of the need to be considerate to all the people we meet and this is also a good message for us all to take on board. Congratulations Aris, you are a credit to the school.

Year 10 were actively engaged in authentic learning on their excursions on Wednesday for History and Geography.

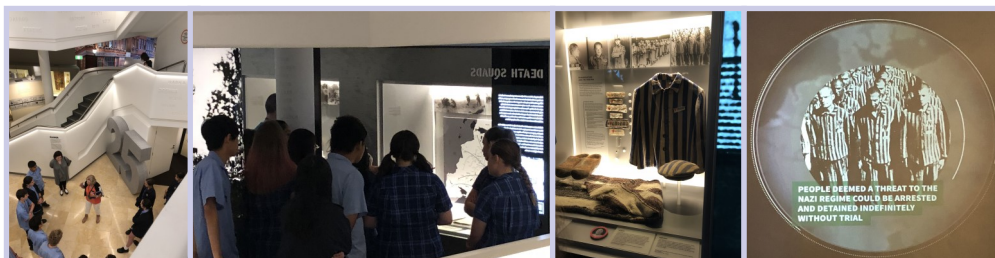

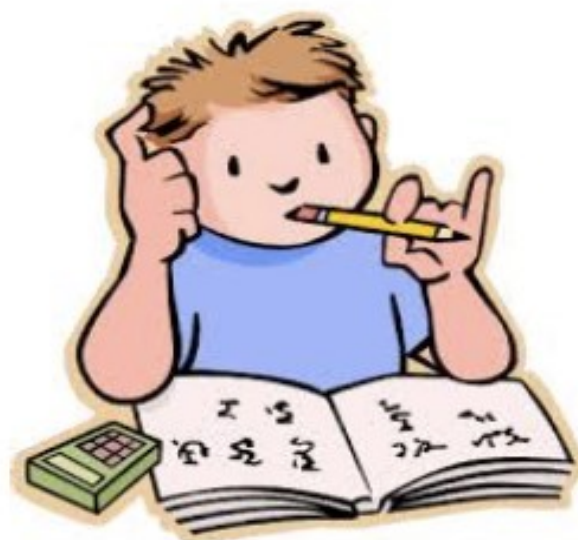

## ST IVES HIGH SCHOOL WRITING CENTRE

### SPELLING

As part of whole school literacy improvements and the Writing Centre participants keen desire to become better spellers here are some ideas for family discussion.

The level of vocabulary encountered in high school is sophisticated. For example, in a survey at the Writing Centre yesterday students from Years 7 to 9 shared that in the two previous days they had learnt words such as cardio pulmonary resuscitation, physicality, nationalism, idiophone, tempo, segregation and post modern.

In order to reach a fluent knowledge of 40 000 to 60 000 words in English by the time students leave school they will need to consciously learn two to three new words **every lesson** for the 40 weeks they are at school. Consciously learning new words means to hear, see and use them at least 7 times before they become part of our working vocabulary.

Spelling of all of these new words will improve through listening and reading. Here is what the Writing Centre students developed to guide them

#### Listen

- listen carefully to the pronunciation of a word
  - sound your word out slowly listening for its syllables
  - listen for 'r' as in Australian Standard English it is very soft and not well articulated
  - Think about and listen out for vowels and consonants. Remember 'y' may be used instead of 'i'.
- Think about prefixes, base words and suffixes to assist you

#### Read

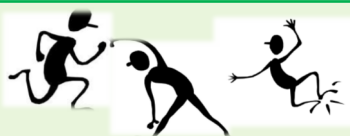
- Keep a list of new and previously unknown words
- Use your vocab list to help your spelling.

The personal vocabulary list that the students developed looks like this:

date	word	diction-ary definition	sound in syllables	base word and etymology	associated words
15/03/18	segregation	the process of dividing some-one or some-thing apart from others	se/gre/ga/tion	to segregate from Latin 'se' apart and 'greg, greg' flock	segregated segregating (drop 'e' and add 'ing')

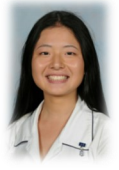
#### SAMMY LEE
