


Year 10 Subject Selection for Year 11 2019

YEAR 10 STEMM BREAKFAST SEMINAR—INSPIRING THE NEXT GENERATION OF GIRLS!



On Wednesday 20 June some Year 10 girls attended the STEMM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths, Medicine) Breakfast Seminar and Careers Forum at the Clinical Education Centre at the Sydney Adventist Hospital. A showcase of some incredibly talented and inspiring female hospital professionals from medical, surgical, nursing and allied health shared their experiences and

imagination to encourage female students to enter the STEMM professions. The underrepresentation of women in STEMM fields and low participation can be traced back to the school years; however, the very personal and authentic conversations with girls motivated many to consider a career in one of those fields.

The women who spoke were diverse in background, age and in their journey to break the barriers in traditionally male-dominated areas. Nadine Thompson, Chief Radiographer began the morning followed by Dr Pecky De Silva – Vascular & Endovascular Surgeon; Dr Michelle Atkinson – Orthopaedic/Spine Surgeon; Amanda McCamey – Midwife, Dr Lee Na Chong – Radiation Oncologist; Dr Hilda High – Medical Oncologist & specialist in cancer genetics; Dr Vivian Yang – Gynaecologist & Robotics Surgeon and lastly A/Prof Payal Mukherjee – ENT Surgeon. All of these exceptionally driven women were passionate about their professions and demonstrated a range of pathways to come to medicine. As the facilitator said: 'you can't be who you can't see' and today we indeed saw who we might become.

As one of our girls stated "...every single one of them was so inspiring because they'd all done so much with their lives and were all so incredibly passionate about their fields and incredibly hard-working. It was great to meet such successful women in an area that I'm interested in and to know that it can be done and that I can do it!"

Personal Security for Students

**STUDENTS CAN BE VICTIMS OF CRIME. HOWEVER THERE ARE A NUMBER OF WAYS
IN WHICH STUDENTS CAN PROTECT THEMSELVES.**

PERSONAL SAFETY TIPS

- Be alert, Assertive and Confident.
- Try and walk with other people rather than by yourself.
- Carry only the money you need for the day.
- Keep your money and wallet in your front pocket and keep your bag in front of you.
- Be aware of your surroundings, avoid long conversations on your mobile or sms while walking.
- At night stay in well lit areas, where there are lots of people.
- If you feel like you are being followed or threatened, cross the street, change direction, vary your pace and enter a shop or occupied house.

IF YOU ARE BEING ROBBED

- Give them what they ask for.
- Try and remember what they look like.
- Report all crimes to the police (Interpreter services are available).

Personal Safety

SAFETY, EVERYONE'S BUSINESS

NSW Police Force

Whether you are young or old, male or female, we all have the right to feel safe, all the time. No other person has the right to abuse you physically, psychologically, emotionally or sexually. If you need help, call the Police.

Knowing how to protect ourselves and joining with other communities to make our communities safer can reduce the opportunity for muggers, bag-snatchers and other criminals to strike.

BASIC RULES FOR PERSONAL SAFETY

- Stay alert, keep your mind on your surroundings, and be aware of what is happening around you at all times. Don't be distracted.
- If you are worried about crime, ask a friend to accompany you when you are out. Show confidence and calmness, stand tall, walk purposefully, and make quick eye contact with people around you.
- Trust your instincts. If you feel uncomfortable in a place or situation, leave if you can as quickly as possible to reduce the likelihood of you becoming the victim of a crime.

When you are out and about

- Travel and shop with friends or relatives when possible. Travel along well-lit roads rather than side streets, back lanes or vacant blocks.
- Limit what you carry in your handbag. Only take what you need. Carry a purse or handbag close to your body and keep a firm grip.
- Do not leave your purse or bag unattended, even for a moment.
- Do not leave your wallet or purse on a counter or in shopping trolleys. Do not leave it on the seat beside you on the bus or train, or in a theatre or restaurant.
- If you suspect you're in danger, walk quickly or run to the nearest shop or well-lit populated area.

Using public transport

- Avoid going out at night time. If you must, wait in a well-lit area and stay close to other people.
- Don't wait at a bus stop or railway station at night any longer than you must – know the timetable.

Crime Prevention Information Sheet

- Try to sit near the bus driver or near the guard's compartment on the train: this compartment is usually indicated by a blue light over the door on the outside of the train.
- Try not to fall asleep while you are travelling. Stay alert.
- At the railway station, stand back from the edge of the platform. Avoid sitting near the exit door of the train as an attacker may be able to grab your property and run before you can react. If you are verbally or physically harassed, attract attention by talking loudly or screaming 'FIRE'.

Banking

- Put away your money before leaving the teller.
- If you must carry a large sum of cash, place it in an inside pocket. Try and separate your money when out in public. Keep some money in different pockets or wallets.
- Do not display cash in public.
- If you use Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs), try to use less-isolated machines. Use ATMs during the day, rather than at night.
- Remember your PIN rather than writing it down. Never give it to anyone.

WHAT TO DO

- Report as soon as possible any suspicious behaviour, or incidents that occur involving you or your buddies. This allows the Police to deal with the matter appropriately, ensuring your safety and the safety of your friends and community. Remember, never be afraid or embarrassed to report a crime, concern, or fear you have to Police. We are here to help you.
- If you are attacked, try not to panic or show any signs of anger or confusion.
- If the attacker is only after your property, surrender it to them because nothing is more important than your personal safety.
- Make a conscious effort to get an accurate description of your attacker; age, race, sex, complexion, height, body build, weight, type and colour of clothing. Call Police as soon as possible after the attack.
