School Acknowledged by St Ives Rotary

Last week, Year 9 took part in their learning journey. While there were activities for Year 9 throughout the day, the highlight would have been each student's learning journey interview. Every Year 9 student is interviewed by a panel of consisting of a teacher, a student and a community member. I have had excellent

feedback from members of the community who took part on the panels. With the permission of the Rotary Club of St Ives, I have reprinted the article that appeared in their newsletter this week. Congratulations to Ms Cartwright and her team for organising such a beneficial day for Year 9.

Di Barnes, Christine Kay and Peter Lorschy participated in panel interviews for Year 9 students participating in the annual "Learning Journey" at St Ives High School. Organised by Claire Cartwright, Head Teacher, Human Society and Its Environment, this is an outstanding opportunity for Year 9 students to formally reflect on their learning achievements and challenges this year.

The reflective practice requires students to think about their learning and their academic achievements. Part of the process includes goal setting and taking responsibility for learning outcomes. This very much supports student empowerment towards becoming autonomous learners who take responsibility for their learning outcomes and achievements.

The process required students to reflect and evaluate two assessment examples this year that they were proud of and one piece of work that requires them to improve their application and their achievement. Students consider their learning outcomes and analyse what they need to do to improve their grades. They then present this information to a panel of two adults and a Year 8 student. The adult panel consisted of staff, parents and members of the community, including Rotary Club of St Ives, Hornsby RSL and someone from Jonathan O'Dea's office. The comments from panellists were supportive and encouraging of future endeavours. Providing a panel of people to present their work to makes for authentic communications that are valuable for all concerned ... students and adults.

While students who were presenting to the panels were in the library being interviewed, their Year 9 peers were engaged in outdoor activities to learn new skills such as: soccer ball juggling, Oz Tag, sign language and learning about the safety features of cars. This day-long enrichment parallel program of practical challenging activities gave additional enrichment to all students in Year 9.

St Ives High School is commended for initiating this innovative program to provide metacognitive challenges for its students and a learning model that acknowledges the importance of self-reflection to enhance student empowerment. Special commendations go to Claire Cartwright who runs this program and works overtime coordinating a day that creates such a valuable learning opportunity for Year 9 students. As they arrived in the Senate, the bells had just been rung for a division and the students were able to see their favourite senators in the chamber for a vote. Following the excitement of Canberra, the group made their way to Berridale for their overnight accommodation while spending their days in the snow. New Building Update

We saw a big step forward in the building of our new sports stadium on Thursday this week. A Geotech company undertook drilling works on the outdoor basketball courts, the proposed site for the new stadium. At this stage the school will have a new two-court stadium built immediately with the possibility of an additional two courts at a later date depending upon input from Ku-ring-gai Council. At this stage, it is envisaged that the initial two-court stadium will be completed during 2020 and will be fully operational in 2021. The works to be completed include a refurbishment of C-Block and it is anticipated that this work will be completed before the stadium.



Year 11 Mental Health First Aid Program

The second session of the Year 11 Mental Health Program was held this week. The program aims to equip students with knowledge about mental health and skills in supporting peers suffering from mental health issues. AN EXCITING OPPORTUNITY FOR THE 2019 SCHOOL YEAR

Expressions of interest are being sought for students in Years 7 – 12 who are interested in improving their Debating and Public Speaking skills in 2019.

Interest is being sought for Debating Master classes for the 2019 school year. The pilot program at St Ives High School will involve team-teaching workshops in the mornings with Mr Moller and trained coaches from Masters Academy. The



34 week program provides hands-on, exciting learning experiences for your child which will not only give them a great insight into the world of debating, but will also teach them core skills such as confidence, public speaking, and essay writing techniques.

The workshops are being planned to take place as 'Period 0' timetable allotments, which would commence at 7:45am and conclude at 8:50am. Class sizes are strictly limited to 20 students per class, with two classes taking place within the week. Dictated by interest, the classes will likely be broken up into a 'Junior' class, and a 'Senior' class. At this stage, the numbers are limited to 40 students.

There will be a financial cost for students in the program, however no student will miss out due to financial circumstances.

A fun and informative day was had by Mrs Cartwright's Year 11 Ancient History Class. We met at Gordon Station and caught the train to Macquarie University and headed to the Museum of Ancient Cultures.

After a brief look at their collection of artefacts from Greece, Rome and Old, Middle and New Kingdom Egypt and the Middle East, we were asked a series of questions challenging us to think about 'conservation' and 'preservation' of artefacts and who should ultimately 'own' or 'look after' the item. Should it be the descendants of the artefact, the Museum, the country it came from or the archaeologist who found it – what do you think? Indiana Jones comes to mind here!

Then came the exciting part of putting on the white gloves as we were able to examine some artefacts (some original and some copies). We learnt what information an archaeologist on discovery could extract about the culture to record in a log e.g. technology, trade, afterlife beliefs, personal adornment.

We went on to watch a PowerPoint about the Roman and Greek armies and the way they were organised and the design of their uniforms. We had a few laughs as we watched two of our classmates dress up in uniform. Gary the Greek and Kailen The Roman. The Romans had definitely put more thought into the design of their helmets and overall armour but after about 20 mins of standing in armour, I think both boys would agree, school uniform is way more comfortable!

We finished our visit at the busy University food court, our stomachs groaning for food, but our brains full of amazing knowledge and facts of the past.
